• The man had shrunk down, thoroughly quelled by the ferocity of the crowd, and the impossibility of escape, but seeing this sudden change with no less rapidity than it had occurred, he sprung upon his feet, determined to make one last effort of his life by dropping to the ditch, and, at the risk of being stifled, endeavoring to creep away in the darkness and confusion.

.....The noose was at his neck. It ran up his weight, tight as a bowstring, and swift as the arrow it speeds. He fell for five-and-thirty feet.

#### Explanation

It is about all the evil things that Bill Sikes did during his life are reciprocal to himself. He died by his own carelessness, he accidentally hung himself. At first, he wanted to hurt Oliver by hanging him but it turned to him. Moral value to be delivered by the writer in this paragraph is that we as humans should selfconscious of all actions done towards others because every action shall be reciprocated, whether it is an evil or goods action.

#### **4.3 Findings**

Moral values as one of the important elements in the novel are also a very important role in our daily lives. On *Oliver Twist*, the author presents many moral values conveyed through the main character which is Oliver Twist. Charles Dickens conveys moral values referring to the life of an orphan concerned with a sense of humanity. Oliver Twist as an orphan who can maintain his attitude and remain as himself despite he always lives in the wrong neighborhood. He is also always steadfast in his stance even though many people are denouncing him.

Moral values to be conveyed by the author are how humans should treat each other like what Oliver Twist always done. He always be polite and kind to the people around him though not a few were always rude to him. It teaches us not to recompense evil deeds with evil too but it can also be repaid with kindness as it is often done by Oliver Twist in the story.

The writer also found moral values in *Oliver Twist* that refer to Nurgiyantoro (2005:323) moral values categories. They are as follow:

1. Relationship between human and ownself.

"but health or sickness made no difference in his warm feelings to those about him, though they do in the feelings of a great many people. He was still the same gentle, attached, affectionate creature that he had been when pain and suffering had wasted his strength, and when he was depend for every slight attention and comfort on those who tended him." (Page 209)

The quotation above described Oliver Twist was a gentle boy. He was still the same gentle Oliver Twist even when he was unhealthy. The pain that he always felt everyday does not make Oliver Twist to change his personality.

2. Relationship between human and other.

"Oliver was told that he might do what he liked with the old clothes, he gave them to a servant who had been very kind to him, and asked her to sell them to a Jew and keep the money for herself." (Page 84)

The quotation above indicated that we as social creature cannot live without other people's help. No matter how poor or rich we are, we still need to help other people in this world. Thus, we should not be selfish.

3. Relationship between human and God.

"They had me nursed, when I was near dying of fever. Oh, pray send them back – send him back the books and money! Keep me here all my life long; but pray, pray, send them back. He'll think I stole them; the old lady, all of them who were so kind to me, will think I stole them. Oh, do have money upon me, and send them back!' Oliver said." (Page 102)

The quotation above indicated that we as human being, we have to believe in the blessing of God. At this critical moment, Oliver Twist still has time to ask God for help. He does not forget the recompense of the person who has taken care of him, he asked God to protect people who has been taking care of him when he was unhealthy. When we are in the same place as Oliver Twist, we should not blame our God but we have to change what we have done before.

According to Nurgiyantoro (2013:460), there are two ways of delivering moral values, direct and indirect ways. Based on the collected moral value, the writer analyzed the ways of the author delivered the moral values in indirect ways in the novel. The writer founds that most of the moral values delivered indirectly because the author not straight describes the moral values in the story but by describing it into the dialogues in the novel.

From all the explanation above, the writer concludes that this novel is representing moral values. The moral values in this novel emphasize the behavior of Oliver Twist towards people around him. The author delivered it through the main character's daily life and dialogues in the novel.

#### **4.4 Discussions**

This chapter discusses about the research questions based on chapter I. The first is about the moral values in the novel. The writer found the moral values through the analysis of the main character's daily life as an orphan. He could be a gentle, kind and polite person while everyone is against him. No one teaches him to be a good person but it naturally came from the bottom of his heart even though he is still ten years old. He could maintain his attitude though he always lives in the wrong neighborhood.

The second is about how the author conveyed the moral values in the story. The author conveyed it in indirect ways because he describes it through the dialogues in the novel. Thus, the readers need to analyze the dialogues first in order to figure out the moral values.

Based on the analysis and findings above, the novel contains many good moral values. It contains about the morality of main character that has good attitude towards people around him. We can take some kind of moral values in this novel as role in our real life.
